No student, regardless of major, will be permitted to advance to the next course without earning a grade of "C" or better in the prerequisite course(s). When a grade below a "C" is earned in a major course, the student must repeat that course. A course may be repeated once without special permission.

BA Option: Students also have the option of completing a Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology. The student must fulfill all SEE requirements, program requirements, and complete two semesters of a foreign language from the point of placement or completion of 202 level.

^MATH-129 Foundational Statistics may fulfill MATH-136. Students receive credit for only one of the following Statistics courses: MATH-136, PSY-136, or MATH-129.
